- Keep in mind that in technology-mediated communications, you don't have access to the range of non-verbal cues you would in a face-to-face meeting. So you have to be mindful of your communication, verbal and non-verbal.
- Be prepared for possible disruptions in connectivity. That is to say, if things go momentarily sideways with technology, do not get overly anxious. Something like this can likely take place. Center yourself and move forward with patience and grace.

We are here for you. May the flame of our chalice help you find a path through this uncertain moment. Step into the present in faith and live into your ministerial vocation of service to others. Sophia Lyon Fahs, that marvelous midwife of theological imagination once said, “It is indeed ‘too late for the old,’ but it is no longer ‘too early for the new...’” (*Worshipping Together With Questioning Minds*, 10). Your service will help give shape and envision Unitarian Universalist ministry anew. Take heart, be courageous, and beloved, be a faithful witness to the transformative power of the promise of our faith.
